Show and Tell

Danny Mok showed his recent purchase of an Egyptian tetradrachm of Ptolemy VII, 180-164 BC:

Educational Program

Jack G. gave an interesting program on a very unique subject – Allied Military Currency (Italy, Germany, France) and Military Currency (Japan) with emphasis on replacement notes in those military issues (like star notes in U.S. currency).

Allied Military Currency (**AMC**) was a form of currency issued by the Allied powers during and after World War II, to be issued to troops entering liberated or newly occupied countries, as a form of currency control.

In France and Germany replacement notes were marked with an "X". In some other places, the original issue had a letter before and after the serial number. Replacements only had a letter at the beginning of the serial number with no letter at the end.

In Europe the four allied nations included the Soviet Union and all shared occupation zones in Germany. Jack said the Soviets wanted to be able to print AMCs so the U.S. gave them the glass positives (I guess those are like the master plates), ink, paper, and finished specimens. The Soviets printed tons of AMCs, so many that the U.S. had to cancel German AMCs and started using German currency.


German AMCs printed by the U.S. had nine digits and were evenly spaced. The Soviets didn't have machines that would print currency with nine digits, so they settled for a six number group together with a three number group. It had nine-digit serial numbers but the spacing between the two groups is obvious, so it is fairly easy to determine which German AMCs were printed by the U.S. and which by the bad guys.


The U.S. was the only occupying force in Japan, so it didn't have to let any other countries print military currency in that country. The regular issue of military currency there had an "A", eight digits, and another "A". Replacement notes there had a beginning letter "H", eight digits and then an "A".

Military currency in Japan was used until 1948 but continued in Okinawa until 1958.

Jack always gives a very polished presentation with lots of information and this one was no exception. Well done. Kevin gave Jack a 1963-D MS Franklin half as a speaker's award.
